Message from the Manse

I'm writing this shortly after having two experiences of God speaking to me and guiding me. Each experience is to do with sermons I preached in succession, and for each, I approached the occasion of preaching the messages I had been drafted with great uncertainty: were these the themes and ideas God wished for me to preach? Were they too simple on the one hand, then too far-removed on the other, to be of any use and relevance?

These kinds of experience are not uncommon to any preacher, and the measure of uncertainty waxes and wanes across the seasons, both in and out of season. But as I said, I believe I had two experiences of God speaking and guiding. To the average person, and certainly to anyone

unaccustomed to God's gentle, yet faithful, ways – to such folks as those, they might easily dismiss those subtle nudges, written off as a figment of imagination or fancy.

But God was faithful, particularly through my day-to-day Bible reading pattern, and so that confirmation came, peace was received, and I stepped out in faith with those messages I believe were from Him – and His Word did not return void, to which all glory is His alone (Isaiah 55:11).

What of you, friends? Where is God confirming and encouraging, wooing and challenging our hearts and ways to confirm to His will? If you are not in the regular habit of reading the Bible in some pattern during the week, then I cannot exhort you enough to find some way of establishing this in your life! There are a great many tools and ideas available, both in print and online - please ask me, the Elders or

Fellowship Group leaders if you are needing some guidance on where to start. After all, 'All Scripture is Godbreathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work' (2 Tim. 3:16) and this includes the Old Testament, as we are seeing in our current series on the Ten Commandments.

And what of us collectively as a church family – where is God speaking to us in this context? Maybe in our times of worship, through (and following) the Word preached? Maybe in our Kirk Session and Team meetings? Would we recognise His gentle whisper, His subtle invitation, beckoning so faithfully, so consistently, to walk in His ways and grace?

One way the Lord speaks to us and meets with us,

rather because of the call of His heart. He put the Law at the service of love and became a servant Himself – even though He is Lord.

It should be the same for each of Christ's followers today! We do not partake of any ministry because it is expected of us or because we feel legally bound to do our "bit"! I believe we need to follow the example of Jesus who said that He came to serve, and not to be served. In the writings of his Epistle, James says; "faith without works is dead" (James 2:26) and goes on to say in Chapter 2 vs 14 "what good is it if a person claims to have faith but has no deeds can such faith save him?"

God has led us all to a place where we can grow together in faith; where we can grow together in Christ's service and where, as a worshipping community in the Upper Braes, we can serve those around us. There are many opportunities available to serve others. Many may be found in the weekly activities sheet or, you could ask an Elder, or the Minister PAGE 4

where you may best help others. Remember, we are all called to serve through our faith in Jesus Christ. We have all been gifted by God, and no-one has been left out! The Apostle Paul tells us: (2 Corinthians Ch 9 vs 12 and 15) "This service you perform is not only supplying the needs of God's people, but it is also overflowing in many expressions of thanks to God."

When each member is doing something, however small, but with the love of Jesus, then we truly will be the servant Body of Christ in the Upper Braes.

May our Lord Jesus Christ bless you in His service.

Mike Glass, Louise Munro and I are there every Monday at lunchtime in the classroom 311, with snacks and drinks provided.

I help at the Bible Fun Club at Slamannan Ministry Centre weekly which has also been a wonderful experience. About 10 young people (P1-P7) attend each week, engaging in singing, praying out loud together, crafts, Bible stories, and lots of joyful dancing! They bring such fun and energy, making every session a delight. If any more children would like to join, they are more than welcome - it is on Wednesdays at 5:30pm at the Slamannan Ministry Centre. A huge shout-out to Linda and Fiona, who have faithfully served here for years, creating a space where young people feel valued and encouraged.

At Flaim (S1-S3) Sunday School, I am continually amazed week upon week at the depth of Bible knowledge the young people have - this is testament to the dedication of the Sunday School leaders and helpers and the teaching they have received throughout their time at UBPC. The Sunday School leaders, helpers and I are currently working behind the scenes to refine the curriculum, so it best serves the needs of our

young people, equipping them to live out their faith and embrace God's promises, both in the joys and challenges of life. Please pray for wisdom as we develop this curriculum, ensuring we teach what is most meaningful and impactful. If you would like to help at Sunday School or the creche then I encourage you to get in touch with Alie Drackford. Thank you to all those who have signed up as mentors so far - your willingness to support our young people is truly encouraging. I appreciate your patience as the program is being

established. If you would like to be a mentor or know a young person who would benefit from this program, please reach out to me. I'd love to help facilitate these connections.

Reflecting on the past few months, I feel incredibly grateful to God for surrounding me with such a supportive community. Your kindness and words of encouragement mean more than you know and serve as reminders of His goodness. Thank you!

If there is anything specific you'd like prayer for regarding the young people, please do let me know. A group of us pray weekly for all the young people in our church and the pupils of Braes High School. We need your prayer requests so that we can present the needs of our young people to God so we can help support you and your families.

Writing on behalf of the Youth Worker Committee, we are excited! Thanks to your very substantial prayer and ongoing financial support, and after a multi-year journey, we can finally hand on the torch! Caroline Whittit is now in post as our Youth Development Worker and doing an amazing job already (see her article in this issue). That means our job as the Youth Worker Committee is complete, and the youth development project is now in the faithful hands of Caroline with the support of the Up and Coming team and the youth development project management team

(Scott, Peter Costello, and Carolyn McEwan). Thank you for continuing to pray and give to support this work.

In the Upper Braes, and across Scotland today, young people are struggling. They are struggling with anxiety and mental health issues; they are struggling with meaning and identity and belonging. They need something, and many of them are searching for that something.

We believe that Jesus can make the difference. As a church we long to

- Engage with their spiritual search and help them meet Jesus.
- We long to Grow their confidence and help them get involved in the church and community.
- And we long to Equip them with the resilience they need to flourish through all the challenges they face.

We see the need, but to date our reach has been limited. In our church we are blessed with many children and young people. We take seriously our commitment to love and include them, and to help them come to know Jesus as their Lord and Saviour. Yet there are so many outside our church, outside any church in the Braes, and outside the Brigades and other activities. Across the Upper Braes, only 5% of young people have any active connection with a church.

Way back in 2016, the Kirk Session started to grapple with this challenge. We soon realised we needed a youth development worker - someone who has full-time responsibility for our youth and the youth of the Upper Braes, and is able to reach out to them, be available to them, and catalyse the work we're already doing to help us reach the other 95%.

Since then, the Kirk

Committee, and many
others of you have been
faithfully working to
understand the
challenges and figure
out how to move
forward. And a little over
a year ago we invited you
all to contribute, both
financially and in prayer.

On behalf of the whole church, and of the young people of this parish, I want to thank you all.

Kirk Session Update

Thinking back to our first Sunday morning service on 3rd
November as the new united Upper Braes
Parish Church (UBPC), I can't quite believe it's been nearly six months since the 15 'ruling Elders' of our new Kirk Session were commissioned!

This commissioning was meaningful for us – a blessing and affirmation of our calling, as we were sent out to serve in the spiritual and practical leadership of our church family.

As you can imagine, these last six months have been a busy time for us! Led by our minister, Scott, the Kirk Session has been navigating the additional practical and governance responsibilities that the Union has brought, as well as upholding our

responsibility of spiritual oversight - ensuring the worship, pastoral care, and teaching within our congregation remains faithful to Scripture.

We formally meet monthly as a Kirk Session. We do make our minutes available - both printed copies in the Brightons and Slamannan Ministry Centres (BMC and SMC) and online on the Governance page of our website (Governance -<u>Upper Braes Parish</u> Church). If you missed these, here's a flavour of a few of the key items/decisions that have been made by Kirk Session since our first meeting on 2nd November.

Post Union Governance – approval of Office
Bearers, Team Structure and Convenors, Local
Worship Leaders,
Safeguarding Convenor /
Panel and our Employee contracts (see photos and organisational charts in both Ministry Centres).
Spiritual Care – approval for the Minister, along

with a small 'reading group' to develop a 'Discipleship Pathway' on the back of the Remissioning course Scott is undertaking. The intention is that the Pathway framework will be used in small groups to develop our congregation's discipleship training and help us mature in our faith. More will be shared on this in due course. Pastoral Care - approval to move to a new Pastoral Care model. with more emphasis on everyone playing an active part, ending the provision of Elders' Districts and Pastoral Groupings. A follow-up communication to all Members and Adherents was made with the Winter 2024 Connect magazine, detailing the ways Pastoral Care is still very much available. Oversight of church finances - including approval for annual budgets/spending limits for the Teams; approval to continue funding the Shieldhill mini-bus. subject to review depending on use;

approval to replace the organ in BMC with a new digital organ; recruitment of Gayle Millar to replace Ian Baillie as Pastoral Assistant for two years. As Trustees we need to ensure we have a clear view of ongoing costs and what is needed for capital projects as we make decisions to approve spend. Strategic finance principles are being developed to help us with our decision making.

Managing property and safety – including approval of the sale of the Shieldhill church building to St Andrews Mar Thoma church and approval of roof repairs to BMC following storm damage.

Policies and Procedures

- approval of the necessary policies to support and safeguard our life together as a congregation (again paper copies of these are available in both Ministry centres and online on our Governance page of our website)

including attesting our
Congregational,
Safeguarding and
Property records to meet

Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR) and Church of Scotland requirements.

Team, Safeguarding and Presbytery Elder
Reports – regular
overview of key activities and approval of names to be added to the

General - including approval of let arrangements with ministry centres with organisations that align to the vision and values of UBPC.

If you have any questions about any of the points mentioned, please do come and see me in person, or drop me an email.

While a lot of our time is spent preparing for, and participating in these monthly Kirk Session meetings, each of the Elders have other roles within our church family; be it serving on one of the many Teams, supporting Scott, taking part in worship, providing pastoral and spiritual support, and so many other behind-thescenes tasks that sustain the life of Upper Braes.

The role of Elder is a responsible one, requiring wisdom, commitment, diligence and prayerfulness, but with it comes the real blessing of serving our Lord, and our church family. I give thanks for Scott and the Elders, who so faithfully serve – it is a real privilege to be part of this great team!

As a Kirk Session we really value your prayers – for wisdom, discernment, encouragement and the sustaining of our leadership, as we seek to serve our Upper Braes family and move forward in strength and unity.

On a personal note, I'd also like to say thank you for all your prayerful support and encouragement I've received over the last two years, first as Session Clerk for the legacy Brightons Parish church then for UBPC. Again, it's been a real joy and privilege to serve and share with you all as we journey together in faith.

For the last four months I've had the opportunity

to spend some time with Stenhouse and Carron Parish Church, attending and taking part fortnightly in their services. They are moving into union with another three churches (Larbert East, Larbert West and Airth) on 1 May. It's been really special to journey with them, sharing both in their sadness as their church buildings are closing, but also their looking forward to becoming part of a new congregation as the Larbert Tryst Church; which they hope will be a source of inspiration, encouragement and renewal for their wider community. A very real example, to me, of God calling us to share in each other's journeys, as we bring our own experiences, which in turn grows our faith and love for each other.

Union Update

As the report from our Session Clerk makes clear, a great deal of work has been undertaken within the Kirk Session in particular to establish the Union, but much else has also been done by others.

We now have a Local Mission Church Leadership Team for the Slamannan Ministry Centre and related areas of ministry. The team is seeking to work closely with all teams and to see the various ministries within Slamannan as part of the wider Union. As such, the Team keeps a broad overview of things without being the primary point of contact for all things within the local mission church. We're still finding our way and any enquiries can be directed to myself or Linda McGarry.

There has been a great deal of work undertaken by those involved with the sale of our Shieldhill building and the advertising of our Muiravonside building. It has been encouraging to

pass stewardship of Shieldhill onto another church and we look forward to partnering with St Andrew's Mar Thoma in due course. With regards to Muiravonside, a few extra steps were required and these delayed the process by some months. However, we are (or will be soon) on the market and continue to be prayerful about this sale. which we do not have the final say on, since the Title Deeds are vested with the General Trustees. As such, they will decide the process and final outcome of any interested parties who offer for the building.

We have also welcomed Rev Monica MacDonald as our Pastoral Assistant since December 2024. and with lan's retirement at the same time, we are now welcoming Gayle Miller, Candidate for Ministry, to be our additional Pastoral Assistant for two years from the beginning of June 2025. It is a delight to soon have full capacity in our Ministry Team, as we also welcomed Caroline Whittit as Youth Development Worker in

January 2025, and we really do look forward to what God will do amongst as with our full compliment of staff serving alongside the church family to further His purposes.

A lot of the things we knew to address have been attended to, and many more we had not expected have also arisen, and we are seeking to faithfully attend to these going forward. God is using this journey to mature and refine us, both in character and our readiness for the next stages of His purposes for us. If there are queries or ideas you have for our collective way forward, then please do speak with me.

Community Audit Update

Over March to October this year, training will be given to help us engage, listen to and connect afresh with our local communities across the whole of the Upper Braes parish. The hope is that this will clarify where we as a new congregation can best get involved, so

The first was held on Saturday 1st March, and it was a really helpful time to get the journey started. 
We are very grateful once again that the GB made beautiful Easter


Friends of Jesus Group

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Report from Graham and Sandra Duncan April 2025

There have been increasing issues at St Augustine's College, where Graham serves on the Senate and Board of Directors, as the college and the two Roman Catholic seminaries in South Africa engage in discussions about a merger which will both serve the training of priests and provide academic training of the Catholic Faith Tradition which is remarkably like the Reformed Faith Tradition! In addition, he is deeply involved in the Ecumenical Theological Commission of the Church Unity Commission, which is working towards providing an ecumenical approach to theological education and the training of ministers. You will see from this that our ongoing mission is an ecumenical venture as denominations are becoming more open to the needs of one another.

Christmas was lovely as usual with our friends' Neil and Stephan's families. Then we had New Year with Jakub and Marve who were home from Ireland. Otherwise, we had a quiet restful time. January began with a burst - Graham off to the University of Stellenbosch and Theological Education by Extension College to have discussions with the institutions where we train our Uniting Presbyterian Church in SA ministers. The cost of education in SA has become very expensive and this was one of the factors discussed as we also engage with our ecumenical partners. The year began well at the Baptist College with numbers holding up despite the rising cost of higher education. We are about to undergo a site visit from the Council on Higher Education regarding the reaccreditation of our programme offerings. Then, in February, the Presbytery of Tshwane officially appointed Graham as minister of St Mark's congregation for a period of two years. This had brought about

a period of stability,

although further changes will come about within the foreseeable future, with congregational decline particularly within our traditionally white congregations.

Sandra had two large projects: a book to be published by a wellknown Old Testament Scholar to edit, and another book about a famous religious stalwart from the struggle against Apartheid. Both were quite large volumes +/- 400 pages each. So this kept her glued to her computer through the first quarter of this year. And then we had a delightful break in the Kruger National Park enjoying a huge variety of wildlife and beautiful sunsets.

Men's Book Group

The Men's Book Group continues to meet regularly every few weeks, with typically 8 or 9 members and a few other "interested followers". Having in the past 18 months completed two different books on biblical themes, we have now moved on to look at a classic title on contemporary issues.

John Stott's "Issues Facing Christians Today" was first published in 1984, but has been revised and updated several times since then. We soon discovered that even though particular subjects rise and fall in levels of public awareness and Christian comment, there are important underlying principles which need to quide our responses both as individuals and as a church. John Stott's writing is a masterclass in clarity of thought and presentation, and even though the book runs to over 500 pages, it is not in any way a daunting read. So far we have only looked at the introductory chapters, but have already been challenged to sharpen our biblical literacy and our social awareness to shape our responses to today's world.

The first three chapters which we have studied look at the world as "Changing, Complex and Plural", and pose questions as to whether Christian witness is "Necessary, Distinctive and Influential". As we move on into further sections we will look at a selection of "Global, Social and Personal" issues. We may not be

able to look in detail at every one of the 13 (!) issues he identifies under these headings; we may not always reach the same conclusions, but we can be sure that we will be stretched and challenged in seeking our own distinctly Christian perspective on matters of continuing debate in the public square of today's media.

If you're up for that, why not join us, even perhaps for a one-off "try it and see"? You'll be welcome. You don't even have to have read the book – the conversation is the thing most of us value at least as much as the reading. Keep an eye on the notice sheet for details.

Romain's last letter reports that his family are doing well. Gives thanks for the support given to him. As the rainy season approaches he is going to sow maize, beans and peanuts. He thanks God for his welldoings towards

them. In a current project he is learning to sing, read bible verses and to respect each other. He asks us to pray for the rainy season so that God keeps them from strong winds and storms. And to pray for his country Burkina Faso.

Romain has now reached the age where he is called up for the armed forces and will no longer be supported by sponsorship. In a country which is under military rule there is an ongoing threat from jihadist rebels and Al-Qaeda, we must pray for peace and safety in Burkina Faso.

The sum of £340.00 is the balance in the fund which is to be given to the Upper Braes Church for forwarding to an appropriate children's charity.





BY MONICA MACDONALD The Management Committee and Volunteers of Martha's Pantry remain grateful for the opportunity to support the communities of Limerigg and Slamannan. According to our service-users, they have benefitted in ways they had never thought. Not only is Martha's Pantry able to provide them with fresh produce and a variety of other food items each week whether frozen or from our shelves, our cooking demonstrations (which include tasting!) has given service-users ideas for making healthy meals on a budget. Our resident (retired) Chef, David, provides a recipe every second week often for a three-course meal, using ingredients that can be found in the Pantry.

Currently, we are deeply concerned that Falkirk Council want to close Slamannan Community Centre where the Pantry is housed. Closure was set for the end of March

2025. A small group from our Management
Committee held
discussions with Council representatives in
February. As a result, the closure has been put on hold for six months (until 30th September) through our having submitted an Expression of Interest to take over the building.

At the time of writing this piece, the Falkirk Council have offered Martha's Pantry the use of a small shop in Slamannan which has been vacant for some vears. The premises can be made available to us under a Community Benefit Lease where the Council foregoes the rent on the basis of the benefit accruing from our activities. There will be other costs of course. but the main cost will be in getting the shop up to a standard that it can be used! We are in the process of costing out such an exercise to establish its feasibility. Funding this project will take more than our current reserves.

As a Community Group, we believe that what our volunteers are doing in

this area of high deprivation (the 3rd highest in the Falkirk Council area) is the Lord's work - being the hands of Jesus, supporting those who find life hard and money too little to go round. The Moderator of the Church of Scotland, Rt Rev Shaw Patterson, in addressing Political Leaders recently said: "Supporting the poorest people in society is a Gospel imperative and at the heart of what the church does".

'I feel like the world was dark before, but now it is light and I have hope and joy. I feel as if I have been born again.'

and joy. I feel as if I have been born again.' How many of us feel like that about the Bible? Those were the words of Nura, a lady living in the Middle East who had been following posts on a social media site which shared verses about Jesus from the Scriptures in her own language. She asked, 'Where can I find a Bible? Tonight Jesus came deep into my heart and I was full of the love and joy of Jesus. Your posts with verses about Jesus make me very happy. I really want to know more about him.' This language, which will soon have its own printed New Testament after 14 vears of dedicated work. is already available on an app, and the believer who posts the Scripture verses this lady read was able to tell her how to find God's Word, Reading it on a digital device will be safer for her than having a physical copy another way in which modern technology can help to spread the Good

News of Jesus Christ in parts of the world closed to Christian workers. We were hearing recently about the work of the Bible Society and how it helps to make God's Word available around the world in a language people can understand. In some countries, however possessing a Bible is illegal; for many it's simply not available in their native language. Organisations like the Bible Society and Wycliffe Bible Translators (to whom I am indebted for this story) are finding ever more innovative ways of reaching people with the Good News - let's continue to pray that the power of God's Word will bring lasting change in the lives of many who are currently in darkness, like Nura, wherever they live.



Interview with Monica and George MacDonald

Last December on an icy afternoon, I delivered the Contact magazine to the MacDonalds. They gave me such a warm welcome and the house was so comfortable that I was tempted to accept the cup of tea they offered. But I had to get on, and Monica had to take a funeral, so I didn't stay. But it occurred to me that I knew little about them except that they were both ministers and both from South Africa. and it would be interesting to find out more.

Fast forward to April and I meet with them again to learn their stories for this interview. And I was not disappointed.

The Background

George and Monica were both born and raised in Cape Town, both in Christian homes, although from different traditions. Monica's father was a Methodist minister. George's father was a carpenter, and his



family were of the Catholic/Anglican tradition. The couple were both aware of their calling from God, Monica quite early as a girl growing up, and George somewhat later.

George worked for 30 years as a Communications engineer in Cape Town, a job which he enjoyed. He study at a Presbyterian was part of the group which installed digital telephones in South Africa, and he was there when the first digital telephone call was made to the South African Ambassador in France. It was a big occasion. Unfortunately, however the ambassador did not receive the call himself, as he was answering a call of nature at that moment!

While working, George was also getting involved in church work. For years he was a Christian street worker with the St Vincent de Paul society, mainly distributing bibles. He was veering more towards Protestantism and in his early 20s had become an elder in a Presbyterian church. It was at a bible church that George and Monica met. Monica

While working full time George was also studying to become first a part time minister and then finally, he made the decision to leave his work to become a fulltime minster. He was ordained in 1995 and served in a Presbyterian church just outside of Cape town.

worked as a para legal at

that time.

In 1997 they made the decision to move to Durban. The children were by this time grown up and George became minister of a church in Durban. Monica while in Durban worked as an admissions administrator at a large private {Catholic} school. They lived in Durban for seven and a half years.

Before they moved to Durban apartheid in South Africa had ended but both had grown up with it and I felt I had to ask how it had affected them. My own understanding was that even churches were affected by it, but both said this was not their experience. Their own parents were in no way racist and the churches they knew were integrated long before apartheid ended. The school where Monica worked had been integrated before 1994.

From Durban to Scotland

George and Monica had travelled broadly during their time in Durban. and they had travelled to the UK three times. George had taken an

interest in the Church of Scotland General Assembly which he watched online.

With many vacancies in the Church of Scotland in and around 2002/2003 the couple travelled to Scotland where George applied for a Certificate of Eligibility and had opportunity also to visit a number of vacant charges, one of which asked him to return to preach as sole nominee in the September of that year (2003). While a move to Scotland was huge, George and Monica both experienced a deep sense of call to serve the Kirk.

In January 2004, George was Inducted to the linked charge of Hamilton South and Quarter, South Lanarkshire. And, they said they were tremendously blessed by the Kirk Session & Board of the Linked Charge's decision to pay for a container so they could have some of their own furniture shipped over which helped them to feel more at home when they moved into the manse.

Of course there was a lot of adjusting to do, not least getting used to the climate. George had brought no long-sleeved shirts and no warm jacket, and it was winter!

George serviced this linked charge for five and a half years before accepting a call to Bonnybridge Parish Church, serving there for eleven and a half years and from where he retired at the age of 75.

Monica had trained as a Lav Preacher in South Africa but now in Scotland she had to start from scratch. She did Readership training. served as a Reader and Locum and later applied for the Ordained Local Ministry. She was ordained on the 4th October 2014 which was also the start of her tenyear ministry serving the Slamannan and Limerigg Parish. She retired from there at the end of October 2024.

Most of us will know that Monica started Martha's Pantry based in the community centre at Slammanan. There she has put into practice her obvious organisational skills. Unfortunately, the community centre is due to close, but the hope is that somewhere else will be found so that Martha's Pantry can continue.

George also volunteers at Martha's Pantry. I get the impression that the couple are very much a team and both are very hardworking.

Charitable Works

While at Hamilton South Iw Quarter, George and Monica set up a Registered Scottish Charity (Friends of Place of Restoration Scotland) to support a Shelter for abused and abandoned children and those with HIV/AIDS called Place of Restoration – an organisation they had already been involved in during their time in Durban.

Annual Garden Parties were held on the lawns of the manse in Quarter and Monica was invited by schools and church groups to speak to them about the charity. Once they moved to Bonnybridge their events took on a

different format - a South African Day where traditional South African cuisine was served. This ticketed event, along with craft sales and donations helped to support the children at Place of Restoration. Over the last 21 years they have been able to raise between £10 000 and £12 000 each year for the charity. With the South African currency being devalued, funds raised here have totalled over 4.5million South African Rand.

Retirement

Upon George's retiral, the couple moved to a house Airth. They love gardening too and have made a garden at their house in Airth where there wasn't one before. They both have hobbies, however. The son of a carpenter, George restores furniture to a beautiful finish. He is a keen photographer and I saw some of his work. Monica enjoys knitting and sewing and made clothes for herself and for the children as they were growing up.

They both love music and travelling. Some of

their travels have taken them to biblical sights in Israel, Egypt, Greece, and Turkey. At Ephesus they held a communion service and their whole coach party attended!

At an age when some of us might be thinking about slowing down, there is little sign of this with George and Monica. Monica, while no longer minister of the Slamannan church has become Pastoral Assistant for the whole Upper Braes Parish. George may be retired but he still accepts invitations to preach, and he supports Monica in all she does.

I feel blessed to have heard their story and am sure there is still a lot to come!

Slamannan Childrens Gala Day 1910

A Gala Day promoted by the Slamannan Cooperative Society (Ltd) took place on Saturday last and was attended with the fullest possible success. Former functions of this kind have been successful in a way, but the one on Saturday created quite a record in every way. The Weather was delightfully fine, and all the arrangements were perfectly made. Large numbers of visitors as well as former residents poured into the village from early forenoon. Throughout the whole district there was a profuse display of bunting. Beautiful, decorated arches bearing appropriate inscriptions and mottos spanned the public highway at Burnrow, Station Row, Station, George Street, New Street Main Street, High street, Blinkbonny and Mosscastle Road, While

at every convenient point flags in great profusion were displayed. The scene which the decorations presented was quite a picturesque and effective one. competition being very evidently keen amongst the inhabitants to have the most gaily decked premises. Neither labour not expense was spared in the decorations which was ample proof that such an occasion in the locality was appreciated.

A special train brought the children from Westfield, Blackston and Avonbridge. While the Longriggend Contingent came with the ordinary train arriving at three o'clock. By this train also travelled the three bands which were to accompany the procession.
